Summary: This measure would finance capital construction and improvements of 2.3 miles of existing Deschutes River Recreation Homesites Unit 6 Special Road District roads. The project would seal approximately 27,840 square yards of road serving the District at a cost of \$135,000 which would be amortized over the 10 year life of this measure. Funds will be used to seal portions of Foster Road, Silver Fox Drive, Bench Leg, Bear Lane, Silver Fox Drive, and Mt Sheep Lane and all of Caribou and Cub Drive.
